The 5,000 year of History of the Sea has been Documented by over 260 Experts through a 5-year Project by Océanides

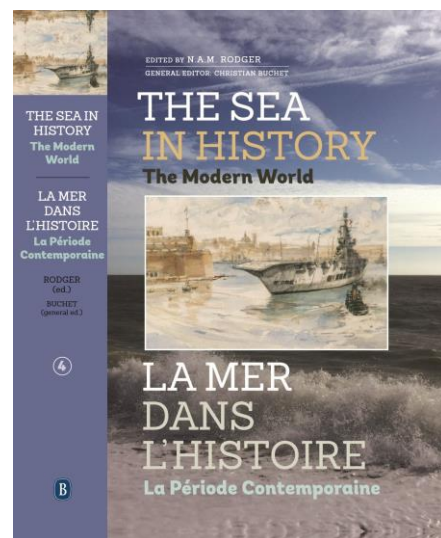
